Beyond the Flip of a Switch

With the mere flip of a switch, electricity illuminates our lives. But have you ever thought about where your power comes from? Most of us don't give it a second thought until our service is interrupted and we're left in the dark—even if only for a short amount of time. In today's world, electricity is a necessity, and this necessity travels a great distance to reach you—our members.

Wheatland Electric Cooperative, Inc., provides electricity to approximately 36,000 meters in our service territory, and it takes a network of dedicated folks to do so. Wheatland builds and maintains overhead and underground electrical lines and manages the equipment needed to provide you with safe, reliable power, but did you know that we don't actually generate the power

that is supplied to your home? That's where our local generation and transmission cooperative (G&T) comes in.

After the power is generated from power plants and sent over Sunflower and Mid-Kansas's high-voltage transmission lines, it then makes its way to Wheatland substations, where the voltage is reduced and the electricity is transmitted over our distribution lines on its journey to your home. After the power voltage is reduced one more time by Wheatland at a nearby pole top or underground transformer it is ready to be delivered to your home safely.

As you can see, there's a little more to obtaining electricity than just flipping a switch, but we've got you covered. Wheatland Electric Cooperative has provided our members with safe, reliable and competitively priced power since 1948, and that continues to be our number one goal today.

SmartHub Software Offers Benefits to Members


Wheatland Electric has recently switched billing software vendors. Along with many enhancements to internal systems and processes, the new software features a number of exciting new features and benefits for our members.

Teaching 35 high school students about electric cooperatives, as well as helping to develop their leadership skills, was an important objective of the 54th annual Youth Tour to Washington, D.C., June 12-19.

BAILEY HARRIS, daughter of Tim and Shelley Harris of Tribune, was selected to represent Wheatland Electric on the trip.

The trip, sponsored by Kansas' electric cooperatives, began in Topeka with several guest speakers at the kick-off banquet. KEC's Bruce Graham led the event and introduced Brant Laue, Chief Counsel for Gov. Sam Brownback, who attended youth tour in 1978; Steven Johnson, Kansas House of Representatives District 108, who attended in 1983; Kyle Hoffman, Kansas House of Representatives District 116, who attended in 1989; and Travis Couture-Lovelady, Kansas House of Representatives District 110, who attended in 2000.

Before leaving Kansas, the students visited Kaw Valley where they learned how electric cooperatives work and rode in a bucket truck. They also toured the Kansas State Capitol.

Once in Washington, D.C., the group visited with Senators Jerry Moran and Pat Roberts, and Congressman Tim Huelskamp, allowing the students to learn about the nation's government

Despite flight delays and cancellations upon departure, the youth were still able to tour the Holocaust Memorial Museum, the Smithsonian museums, Mt. Vernon, Arlington National Cemetery, several memorials, along with seeing the Broadway musical Disney’s *The Lion King* at the Kennedy Center. The delegates also attended the NRECA Youth Day, which celebrated the 50th anniversary of NRECA coordinating the Youth Tour trip.

This year’s trip was chaperoned by Wheatland’s Shawn Powelson and his wife, Lisa. “KEC promotes this trip as the trip of a lifetime, and that certainly

isn’t an exaggeration by any means,” Powelson said. “Despite a challenging start to the trip, the overall experience is one I will not soon forget. 

Heating and cooling a house often accounts for the majority of a household's monthly energy costs. Many homeowners have a great opportunity to save energy and money by installing a more efficient HVAC system.

Essentially, higher efficiency equates to lower monthly energy bills and improved comfort. For

example, you could receive a \$410 rebate for a four-ton (48,000 BTU) heat pump.
